Sanjay, who is from Sri Lanka, stated that, after arriving in the U.S. in 1990, she completed her BSN in 1997 with a passion for community health nursing. She has worked in acute care and long-term care for the past 14 years with a focus on health

promotion and disease prevention, and now, after receiving her MSN from U of H Sugarland, would like to work with local physicians for several years to gain experience. After that she envisions herself educating patients and raising the level of healthcare awareness in the area. As for her work up to this point Ms. Abeyadeera stated, "I know for a fact, in my experience, I have influenced in a positive way, my patients, families, and even community leaders."

The University of Houston College of Nursing was founded in 2006 and boasts some pretty impressive statistics for student outcomes. Located primarily on the UH Sugarland campus, graduates had a 100% pass rate on the NCLEX-RN exam for the second consecutive year, putting the College in the top 5% in the nation. Also, the pass rate on the national certification exam by Family Nurse Practioner graduates was 100% for two consecutive years, and gradu-

ates of the MSN program have a 100% employment rate.
